


CAN'T HEAR ME SCREAM

About 2 weeks ago, I sent an email out to a couple of local anarchist lists asking if anyone was interested in doing prisoner support work and possibly starting an Anarchist Black Cross group. I only received two replies. I am now in prison with one of those people. Strange how life goes. At the moment, we are facing charges under the Arms Act with a possible sentence of 4 years. More charges may come as the police desperately try to make us New Zealand's first terrorists. We are not terrorists.

What is a terrorist? Someone who terrorises. In this camp I would put most world leaders and heads of multi-billion dollar corporations. I would also put the NZ Police Force who terrorise local communities around Aotearoa with almost total impunity.

This zine is happening because I am in prison. It is dedicated to all the people on the inside who are suffering the injustice of this system, everyone on the outside fighting to destroy it. Kia Tahia



AROHATA WOMEN'S PRISON

There are approximately 150 women here. I am in the high-med security part of the prison called the 'Third Wing'. I am with other women on 'remand' which means they have not had a trial, nor been convicted of any crime. The 15 or so women here are almost all Māori. New Zealand's rate of incarceration for Māori people is 6 times greater than it is for the general population. New Zealand also has the 2nd highest per capita rate of incarceration in the world - second only to the United States. All of the women here, with the exception of me and my co-accused, smoke tobacco. Tobacco forms a small economy in prison serving as a currency for bartering. It seems to me that it is just simply another form of slavery - to this sick addiction, and in here, it drives many to violence when not 'shared' as per an unwritten set of rules. Prison has its own economy otherwise, in packets of butter or sugar or a tea bag.

This is the micro-economy of prison - people just trying to get by and make the time here a little bit more bearable. There is a great macro-economy of prisons, too - it is the "prison industrial complex" and it is a fundamental part of our exploitative economic and social system. Whenever you impose a system or way of doing

things and use violence to enforce it, you will get resistance. When you have a system that not only makes it possible for someone to PROFIT from that violent enforcement, but actually requires it, you can be certain that there will always be prisons full of people.

The greater economics of prisons is phenomenal and is intimately tied to the growth of private security firms and by extension, weapons manufacturers and war profiteers. I have been most struck, however, by the little coercions and power-trips. They are so subtle that you hardly notice your compliance. The guards who say 'you treat us like you want to be treated' except that you are the one who has to beg for a phone call or a pen or some soymilk or a visit to the doctor. It is the way you have to eat all your food before they come back for your dishes. It is a lot like school only there is never any holiday or recess.

Two things are glaringly obvious about this place - the first is that all prisoners are political prisoners and secondly that the inherent nature of such 'punishment' means you cannot even hope to emerge from such a place better than when you went in, it is to enforce your obedience to violence. That's all.



a contract to protect them. Since I got here, one of the cleaners was summarily dismissed after a disagreement with the guard.

Prison slave labour is nothing new, of course. Prison chain gangs, sweatshop clothing manufacture and making licence plates are the stuff of legend. More recently, the selling of prisoner's bodily organs in China has become a booming business. Prisoners are largely disposable people, to be used and exploited to the extent that the State believes it can get away with it.

In Aotearoa, the prison population is marginalised and largely disregarded as human as soon as they walk through the steel gates. It is not a world that middle-class NZ'ers want to have anything to do with.

All of this is just an example of the violent brutality of this prison state, the nature of the 'prison business' and the complicity of the middle-class who turn a blind eye to it all.
